#### 2.1 Minutes of Previous Meeting

## 4. Confidential Reports

### 4.1 2022-23 SLRP Grant Round

LGTAP considered thirty-six applications totalling \$21,122,000 for the 2022-23 SLRP grant funding round. Available funding is \$16,214,000.

It was noted that the SLRP Coordinator has undertaken an initial assessment of each application against the criteria as set out in the recently updated Special Local Roads Program Policy Manual. The Regional LGAs and Metropolitan Strategic Roads Committee (MSRC) were also contacted and invited to provide comment on each application submitted within their region.

The Panel noted that MSRC did not achieve a quorum and were therefore unable to provide comments on the applications submitted from within their region.

LGTAP reviewed each application, taking into account the initial assessment results and the comments provided by the Regional LGA's, and provided draft recommendations for twenty-six applications.

The Panel agreed that further clarification will be sought for the ten remaining applications and the Panel will reconvene to formalise the recommendations. Questions will be sent to councils where further information is required.

A record of the LGTAP discussion and recommendations on each application is provided at Attachment A.

#### Conflicts

During the LGTAP meeting it was noted that:

- Mr Richard Dodson declared an interest as Deputy CEO of Light Regional Council, in relation to the applications submitted by the Light Regional Council. Mr Dodson did not participate in discussion relating to these applications.
- Mayor Keith Parkes declared a perceived conflict of interest as the President of the Southern Hills LGA and Mayor of Alexandrina Council, in relation to the applications submitted by the Southern and Hills LGA. Mayor Parkes did not participate in discussion relating to these applications.

### Discussion

The LG Transport Advisory Panel reviewed and considered thirty-six applications for funding within the 2022-23 Grant Round at its meeting on 14 June 2022.

The LG Transport Advisory Panel agreed to support twenty-two applications, to a value of \$11,538,000. Four applications were not supported by the Panel.

Ten applications required further information / clarification before a decision could be made, with the Panel agreeing to write to the applicants with their questions and resolving to meet at a later date, out-of-session, to further assess and provide recommendation on these applications.
